The students were also given a choice of 02 PG Diplomas, PG Diploma in Mass Communication and Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications. • The teaching of curriculum is regularly revised and requisite changes were made in response to student and contextual needs. • The curriculum has taken a trans-disciplinary approach and is based on human values, gender awareness, technical advancement, and ecological sustainability. • Curriculum is delivered through varied modes such as lectures, role plays, tests, assignments, quizzing, interactive sessions, group discussions, PowerPoint presentations and usage of other ICT tools. • The college library is well stocked to match the requirements of the curriculum. • A number of extension activities are carried out keeping in mind the well-being of the community. 1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

### Feedback Obtained

The college collected feedback from various stakeholders i.e. students, Teachers, Employers, Parents and Alumni through a manual feedback proforma. Analysis was done and the analytical report is presented to the Feedback Review Committee constituted at the college level. The committee carries out a thorough and exhaustive analysis of the feedback report and lists out the areas to be worked upon. Student feedback is considered to be one of the most important aspect. Questions based on quality of teaching, internal evaluation process, infrastructure, medical facilities, functioning of Placement cell, Youth welfare activities and redressal of student grievances were covered in the feedback form. Students were also encouraged to give their reviews in the Tutorial meets. Suggestions given by them were discussed by the committee with the Principal and management of the college. Feedback from the faculty members was collected on different parameters which included opportunities provided to the staff for continuous development, adequate medical facilities, library facilities, ICT based teaching, encouragement for research work, equal opportunities for all staff members , etc. They were also encouraged to give their valuable suggestions in staff meetings conducted regularly from time to time for more effective running of the college. Similarly Employers feedback is also considered to be an important parameter for the overall development of the students. The college has a policy to give job opportunities to our toppers and hardworking students within the campus. In addition, a few students joined our sister institutions in various capacities. The feedback is utilized to improve the overall working of the college. As the alumni are found to be the brand ambassadors of our institute, the feedback of the alumni is given a due consideration. Annual Alumni Meet is organized by the college every year. It provides an efficient mechanism for gathering feedback from the Alumnae. This year also, besides organizing a cultural gala, responses were sought with respect to campus environment, infrastructure, learning experience, academic initiatives along with student support facilities. In order to take feedback from the parents, regular Parent Teacher Meetings were conducted by the college and suggestions were invited from them through feedback forms. The parameters like student teachers relationship, infrastructure, learner centric teaching models, research opportunities for the students, research guidance, placement counseling were covered in these forms. Relevant issues were discussed freely in order to improve the institutional credibility. The recommendations of the Feedback Review Committee are given due consideration and are implemented at all the levels. The IQAC chalks out a plan of action for the next academic session to further improve the productivity and efficiency of various academic and administrative procedures of the college. Action plan is formulated from suggestions pertaining to future changes and the progress is monitored



regularly. The points of concern put forward are worked upon towards the betterment of the institution.

#### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Student's well-being and success is one of the primary goals of any institution of higher education. Mentoring is one of the methods adopted at GNKCW to ensure that there is a consensual and meaningful relationship between the Mentor and the Mentees that leads to their overall growth and development. Student mentorship has the following aims: 1. To enhance teacher student contact hours 2. To enhance students academic performance and attendance 3. To minimize student dropout rates 4. To identify and understand the status of slow learners and encourage advance learners 5. To render equitable services to students With a wide variation in the student population in regard to educational and economic background, this system promises to provide a

better understanding of individual students and bring out their highest potential. The Student mentoring system (SMS) programme implementation has the following phases: Phase I: Select students and mentors from the entire strength of institution Phase II : Allotment of the students to the mentors. Phase III: Interaction of students with the mentors and identifying strength and weakness of the mentees. Forming whatsapp group, if possible, to keep contact among the group. Phase IV: Periodic meeting of the mentees with the mentors and remedial training of the learners, training students to take up higher skills. Phase V: Obtaining feedback from the students at the end of the session. 39 Students mentoring groups( Major group ) were made in the year 2018-2019 and remaining 34 minor mentors helped these major mentor in the performance of their duty. Each group is assigned a teacher/mentor who would perform mentoring duties. Total Number of Students was 1504 and mentor mentee ratio was 1:40 (approx.). Main duties of mentor at GNKCW are a.) Mentors maintain and update the mentoring format which contains space for entering particulars and performance of students(class tests, monthly attendance records etc.) b.) After collecting all necessary information, mentors offer guidance and counselling, as and when required. c.) It is the practice of mentors to meet students individually or in groups. d.) In the isolated cases, parents are called for counselling/special meetings with the Principal at the suggestion of the mentor. e.) If a student is identified as having weakness in particular subject then it is the duty of mentor to convey to the concerned subject teacher. f.) Mentor maintains personal details of student including their address, contact number, overall academic performance and progress. g.) Mentor advises the students regarding choice of elective subject, projects, summer training, etc. h.) Mentor also guides the students in taking up extra academic and professional activities for value addition as a member of the society. i.) Mentor informs Principal of the college of the mentees leave or absence. She also advises in the matter of their career.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college follows the broad guidelines given by the Panjab University, Chandigarh for conducting the Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE). Internal Examination is held every semester in the form of Mid-semester Tests (MSTs) to give adequate revision and practice to the students. PU Examination paper pattern is followed in the MSTs also to help students prepare for final exams. These exams help evaluate the current progress of the student in class and can identify subject areas where improvement may be needed. The faculty members tabulate the result of their classes and assess the same, comparing it with university results. It is an effective method to crosscheck and verify whether information taught is being correctly assimilated. Internal assessment is given to students based on their assignment, performance in MSTs, class interaction and attendance. Remedial classes are held for the weak students. Advanced Learners are provided need based additional support/guidance to help them bag merit positions in the University. In addition, every department tries to bring innovation in classroom teaching and evaluation through assignments, presentations, snap tests, quizzes etc. which foster creativity among the students as well as motivate them to learn beyond the textbook. Students are allotted topics for oral/written assignments and PowerPoint presentations which improve the communication skills of the students and facilitate the evaluation process.

**Decentralization of Authority:** The College inculcates the culture of collective responsibility amongst its faculty members and the constitutive departments. The college delegates authority and provides operational-autonomy at various levels. Under the supervision of Principal, Heads of the Departments are empowered. The departments are provided academic autonomy which is a concrete step towards effective decentralized governing system. Each department is given freedom to prepare its academic planner and schedule of activities, designing and assigning of student projects, to conduct workshop/hands-on-training programs/extension lectures on areas prioritized by the departments. For every activity or event of the college, the authority flows from the Principal to the Convener, from the Convener to the Coordinators and finally to event- specific committees consisting of faculty members along with Student Representatives such as the Organizing Committee, Discipline Committee, Reception Committee, Stage Committee etc. to manage and execute all the arrangements. Faculty

members supervise all the activities related to the college from the beginning till the end. All activities right from ideation of the event to organizing (technical support, sponsorships, gifts, press, invitations, managing finances, seating, decor, planning and preparing different items and events, discipline and hospitality) are delegated from the central authority to different committees for collaborative and enthusiastic implementation. Students' Council: The Student Council of the college is called Central Association (CA) led by the Head Girl and Deputy Head Girl (s) of the college. The other members of the CA are duly elected by the teachers and the students. Class representatives are elected by the students for their respective subjects at the beginning of the session. In addition, all clubs and societies also elect their student representatives. The election of the Head Girl and Deputy Head Girl (s) is done by the chosen representatives of the staff comprising the Selection Committee. Investiture Ceremony of the Head Girl, Deputy Head Girl, Presidents, Vice-Presidents and all the Class Representatives takes place and the students are made aware of their role and responsibilities as the elected members of the Central Association. The primary aim is to promote and encourage the involvement of students in organizing the activities of the college and to officially represent all the students in the Institution. For all events, the college believes in keeping the student leadership at the forefront. CA members assist in encouraging and maintaining discipline. They also attempt to identify and help solve problems encountered by other students. It is the key responsibility of the Central Association to communicate its opinion to the administrative authorities on any subject that concerns students and on which the council wishes to be consulted.

Additional coaching is provided for the average students. Subjective and Objective type question papers, multiple choice question papers are prepared by the faculty and provided to the students. Timely assessment of tests is done and the result is displayed. Overall evaluation of a student is done on the basis of attendance, participation in tutorials, class seminars, assignments and internal examination. Theory examination and practical/oral examinations are conducted as per Panjab University schedule and norms. The faculty members actively participate in the examination duties like question paper setting, invigilation of theory examination, evaluation of answer scripts, internal examiner and subject experts for the University examinations and assessment of theory examinations' answer books

Research and Development

The College motivates the faculty and students to undertake research projects in NPTEL, MOOC'S, Swayam Portal etc. Well equipped Research Labs are developed for the funded projects to improve quality of the research. The College motivates the faculty to undertake research activities through doctoral Programmes. The College

motivates faculty and students to publish research and review papers. Faculty members are encouraged to attend and present papers in national and international conferences and seminars in the country and abroad for which financial assistance is provided.
