15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The inter-disciplinary approach helps to integrate knowledge from different disciplines by using a real process of synthesis. It tries to create holistic knowledge by integrating knowledge from different disciplines. The multidisciplinary approach utilizes the view points from different disciplines for understanding a case, or issue. Multidisciplinary approach not only broadens the thought process of scholars but also brings clarity about all issues and events. It enables the students to explore topics from different angles, allowing them to form their own opinions and views. It can be implemented at an institutional level in many ways . Our College organizes many interdisciplinary webinars/Workshops/FDPs to promote a blending of different disciplines and enhance the knowledge on topics of overlapping domain. They are organized for academic and skill enhancement of both teaching faculty and non-teaching staff across all disciplines eg:. FDP on "Hapttitude at Work', 'Discovering One's Potential as a Teacher.", Workshop on "Role of Artificial Intelligence in Education with special reference to pedagogical value of ChatGPT"etc. The college offers multidisciplinary Add-On Courses such as Functional English, Fashion Designing. In B.Com course Interdisciplinary Subjects are included in the curriculum (Interdisciplinary Psychology for Managers , Interdisciplinary E -Commerce , Interdisciplinary Issues in Indian Commerce, , Interdisciplinary Security Analysis and Portfolio Management) Membership of NSS, NCC, EBSB, Unnat Bharat Cell and various clubs & societies is open to all students as is participation in various social outreach activities. All the activities are designed in such a way that all students can get maximum exposure, develop vital skills, and gain confidence. It sparks enthusiasm for learning and provide students with a more diverse, flexible, and engaging educational experience, well-suited for the complex and dynamic careers of the 21st century.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credits promotes flexibility of curriculum framework and interdisciplinary or multidisciplinary academic mobility of students across HEIs in the country with appropriate credit transfer mechanism. These regulations facilitate students to choose their own learning path to attain a degree or diploma Post

Graduate diploma or certificate. It works on the principle of multiple entry-multiple exit as well as any-time, any-where, and any-level learning. Our college is affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh and has not yet implemented Academic Bank of Credits. Academic Bank of Credits, formulated on the lines of National Academic Depository (NAD), will be implemented as per the guidelines when received from the affiliating University and the Department of Higher Education.

17.Skill development:

Skill development refers to identifying one's skill gaps, learning new skills, or improving existing ones. It encompasses a broad range of soft skills, such as communication, critical thinking, teamwork, and hard skills like technical proficiency. This helps them to develop the core competencies which in turn make them more employable for the job market. The institute organises various activities for the development of soft skills, life skills and values in students. Entrepreneurial endeavours to nurture the employability quotient in the students are also emphasised. Discussions, Webinars, FDPs are organised as a regular feature. Experts from the industry/professionals are invited by various departments such as Fine Arts, Home Science, and Music etc. to hone the technical skills of the learners. The college has introduced 'Earn While You Learn' program pertaining to the Skill Development in the view of NEP 2020. Under this scheme, students participate in many activities. They set Diya Exhibitions, Mehndi Stalls and Food Stalls from where they earn with learning skills. Aloo, kachaloo, shakarkandi-fruit chaat counters were set up by the students of Home Science .on October 01, 2022. Students set up Bhel Puri stall on the occasion of Parent Teacher meet under Earn While You learn scheme of the college on April 15, 2023. Valentine Alumni Carnival was held in the college on February 17, 2023. Under this, budding entrepreneurs among students were given a chance to set up their stalls of various items in order to generate profits. The products were sold at handsome profits. The attempt was to build up confidence among women students to set up their own ventures in future and find ways of employment generation for many . This good practice enables them to earn while learning the proposed skill and promotes entrepreneurship. Mentor Mentee Groups have been formed and regular meets are held from time to time supporting students to improve their learning and leadership skills, motivating them towards their future career development. The college forms Buddy Groups of the students where they come together to fight against numerous menaces

prevalent in the society. The college also organises career counselling drives and counselling on attaining vocational skills eg: "Future Business Sharks" contest was held in the college for the students of B.Com and BBA on October 04, 2022, Workshop on "Interviewing Skills" for students on November 11, 2022. A workshop on 'Decorative items out of waste products' organized on the campus on February 22, 2023 etc.To inculcate positive and ethical values among the students, the institution provides value based education in form of organising various competitions on human values, speeches on constitutional, fundamental and universal values. It focuses on measuring student performance i.e. outcomes at different levels. Our institution has adopted teaching methodology based on an integration of concepts and theories with practical knowledge and problem solving skills. The learning culture at our college is based on outcome-based education. All programmes/course outcomes running in the college at U.G. and P.G. level are prominently displayed on the college website. The prospective students seeking admission in the college can access this outcomes of various programmes as well as courses within them. The teaching faculty also share these in their respective classrooms and try to deliver the respective courses in accordance with their outcomes. Continuous assessment of student's performance is done through group/ individual tasks, quizzes, class tests, field/project work, assignments, internships etc. Students participate zealously in diverse Outreach/community welfare activities through various National programmes such as NSS, NCC, Swatchhta Abhiyan, Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, Ek Bharat Shreshta Bharat and win accolades at different platforms. The college runs Add on courses in Fashion Designing and Functional English. ICT Tools and e-Resources are used by faculty to aid the teaching-learning process, eg. Smartboards, Projectors, Printers and Scanners Visualizers, Digital Tablets, Multimedia Computer System Google Slides MS Word, Google Docs, Google Forms, Adobe Photoshop , Screencasto-matic, Screen-Castify , Canva, Slack etc. Seminar halls, some classrooms and laboratories are equipped with projectors and computers and Internet facility . The College library also provides access to e-resources. . These efforts promotes student learning.

- Remedial classes are also conducted to give a chance to the slow learners.

- 4. The faculty members are informed well in advance of their due promotion.
- 5. The PBAS proforma filled by the Faculty Member is checked and verified by IQAC Co-coordinator and Principal.
- 6. Faculty members whose promotions are due are recommended based on their API score and are required to appear before the screening-cum-selection committee.

Non-Teaching Staff

All non-teaching staff are also assessed through annual confidential reports and annual performance appraisal.
